**Pigface Polka** (by David Wanless, 29<sup>th</sup> January 2015) Commissioned for the World Wetlands Day celebrations in Lauderdale, Hobart on 31<sup>st</sup> January 2015 and a concert following the launch of a book of Tasmanian Saltmarsh Wetland plants. Named for the succulent Native Pigface, *Carpobrotus Rossii*. The dance form represents the shape of the beautiful purple flower. Formation: 3 or more cpls in waist shoulder hold facing clockwise around a circle Steps: Polka, chassez. Level: Easy. Lk = Lark (person on left of couple). Rb = Robin (on R).
